G-COE 'Rebuilding Cities for Cultural Creativity and Social Inclusion' Application Rules for Young Special Researchers - February 2010 Applications -

The Global Center of Excellence (G-COE) research base 'Urban Research Plaza' is seeking applications for G-COE Young Special Researchers for 2010 according to the terms below in order to support proactive and world class research activities by young researchers.

Two course classifications have been set up based on research style for G-COE Young Researchers. In 'A', the Global Course, the researcher conducts research activities such as field work and presentations at international conferences under the general supervision of a host research advisor. In 'B', the Meister Course, the researcher pursues an independent research project that is closely linked to the host researcher's own project. Please see the attached chart of research themes and researchers able to act as host researchers, and make applications appropriately.

1. Applicant Categories, Remuneration, and Personnel

At this time, the two course classifications, the 'A' Global Course and 'B' Meister Course are each divided into three categories (according to academic level) for a total of 6 categories.

Those chosen for acceptance based on their research plans, etc. (including application for research funds) will be appointed as G-COE Special Researchers and will be able to carry out research using the funds specified in their research plans. They will also be paid a researcher salary, depending on their academic degree level and whether they are receiving fellowships or pay from other sources. However, we will not provide duplicate research funding or duplicate pay, so there may be cases where travel expenses are not allowed and salaries are not paid.

Notes:

- G-COE Special Researchers must make at least one research presentation per year at workshops or seminars
- Research plans may be extended up to three years total, but research fund budgets are approved on a yearly basis. Research Result Reports (interim reports) and budget reports must be submitted yearly.
- Research funds are disbursed according to the rules of the university. It is possible that not all expenses
 will be reimbursed.

2. Applicant Qualifications

The applicant must match one of the categories below (1-4), must be able to specify as 'Host Researcher' someone who belongs to the G-COE 'Restructuring Cities for Cultural Creativity and Social Inclusion' base, and must be able to pursue research as their main occupation while registered as a G-COE Special Researcher (not bound by work responsibilities at other institutions).

• In applying, applicants should first contact a 'Researcher Qualified to be a Host Researcher' as listed in the attached chart.

The oral interviews will be conducted at Osaka City University's Urban Research Plaza (3-3-138 Sugimoto, Sumiyoshi-ku, Osaka) on March 3rd, 2010 (Wed.). (Candidates will be notified of the details).
